Suicide Prevention Walk

My husband, Barney Tong, and I sat in the audience at Saddleback Church, and listened to Pastor Rick Warren talk about his son, Matthew, who suffered from a mental illness. He died by suicide in 2013. As I listened and started sobbing, I thought thank goodness our children are OK. Unfortunately, 6 months after we heard the devastating news about Pastor and Kay Warren's son, the unthinkable happened. Evan Tong, Barney's son, my stepson, died by suicide on December 28, 2013. Evan was only 17 when he died. Evan loved video games, reading, and swimming. Hundreds of family, friends, school faculty, and community members came to remember Evan at his memorial services in WA and CA. Barney and I received comfort, support, and love during this difficult time from God first, our families, friends, our Bible study group, and colleagues. However, we lost

friends because of the stigma associated with suicide. Others did not want to engage in discussion about Evan. Joining the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP) has helped us immensely. **AFSP is the “leading national not-for-profit organization exclusively dedicated to understanding and preventing suicide through research, education and advocacy, and to reaching out to people with mental disorders and those impacted by suicide.”**

May was Mental Illness Awareness Month

AFSP mentions that “there is no single cause to suicide. It most often occurs when stressors exceed current coping abilities of someone suffering from a mental health condition. “Suicide can happen at any time and unfortunately, when one least expects it. It happens to the young, the old, a rich or poor person, immigrant or natural born citizen. Also Pastor Rick Warren mentioned, "There's no shame when any other organ in your body fails, so why do we feel shame if our brain is broken?"

Barney and I are joining hundreds of people to walk 18 miles through the night in the Out of the Darkness Overnight Walk to benefit the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP). This will be our third Overnight Walk and our sixth Out of the Darkness Walk. This year we will walk in San Francisco on May 21-22, 2016. We have walked in Seattle, Boston, Fountain Valley, CA and Pasadena, CA to raise funds for AFSP. We walk for countless others who died by suicide. Our friend, Chris Atencio, a veteran of the US Army, also died by suicide not long after Evan died. (cont'd)

One of Our Own – 40th Anniversary of the SON

We are pleased to highlight Dr. Julie Pusztai in this edition of the Iota Sigma newsletter. Dr. Pusztai was a member of the very first class of nursing students that completed their BSN from what was then Azusa Pacific College in 1977. The School of Nursing is celebrating 40 years of educating nursing students and Dr. Pusztai was willing to share some of her insights of change since the beginning.

In 1977 when Dr. Pusztai graduated the nursing program was a 2+2+1/2. The education program was approved by the California BRN but wasn't accredited until the results of that first class taking the state nursing board(s) NCLEX were known. The nursing school was accredited due to the first graduates' passing scores on the board exam. This began the long 40-year history of which Dr. Pusztai is a part. Since that time almost 100 students each year have attended APU and completed their nursing education. There are more than 1000 students enrolled in the APU SON this year including all the various programs. There have been many changes since Dr. Pusztai was a student.



Dr. Pusztai's first job was as a nurse in an acute care medical surgical unit. After a short term mission at a small hospital in Ecuador, she began her many years as a public health nurse. In the 1990's Dr. Pusztai decided to return to APU and study for her Master's of Science in Nursing. She focused on family mental health and did her clinical work at Aurora Charter Oaks in the late 1990's. She joined the faculty of the SON as an adjunct in 1999, became the Director of the Neighborhood Wellness Center in Azusa in 2007, and has been continuing in that position since that time. She completed her PhD from Loma Linda University in the summer of 2015.

One of Dr. Pusztai's interesting jobs was being a nurse-indexer for CINAHL the nursing database for nursing and medical literature and research that is now part of EBSCO. Dr. Pusztai would read the articles and assign

search words and research terms to the articles so other nurses could search for the information through the database using those search words. She said she was always reading really fast but enjoyed this job as a way to stay in touch with advances in nursing, as she was a working stay at home mom during those years. (cont'd)

Some of the changes that Dr. Pusztai has seen over the years at APU SON include the 2+2 curriculum changing to a 4 year curriculum, leaving behind white nursing caps and student pen-stripped uniforms with aprons, the requirement for a pathophysiology and a nursing research class, the change in the theory the APU SON uses on which to base care plans, the beginning of this chapter of Sigma Theta Tau, International, and many of her teachers retiring from teaching. One of the most influential people in her nursing education was Dr. Barbara Artinian one of our well-known retired professors. Dr. Artinian saw her ability and encouraged her to pursue her terminal degree.

If you have a chance to speak to Dr. Pusztai be sure to ask about her dissertation. She did a qualitative study looking at the lived experiences of the aging population. Her title was *The Lived Experience of Aging: Listening to the Oldest-Old*. She would be delighted to tell you her findings.

Faith Community Nursing

The Foundations of Faith Community Nursing course concluded March 10, 2016 with eleven nurses receiving their certificate of completion. The course is taught by Deborah Ringen MSN, RN-BC Faith Community Nurse, adjunct faculty and International Parish Nurse Resource Center (IPNRC) Faith Community nurse educator, under the direction of Marilyn Klakovich DNSc., RN, NEA-BC.

To meet the needs of adult learners in this busy world, the course was taught on-line for 7 weeks and concluded with a 2-day retreat. Students were enrolled from California and Connecticut requiring 2 retreat locations. Mater Dolorosa Passionist Retreat Center in Sierra Madre, California hosted the California students and Mercy By the Sea in Madison, Connecticut was the setting for the East coast students. Both settings offered beautiful, peaceful surroundings and delicious meals which enhanced the relaxation and revitalization of the attendees.

The Foundations of Faith Community Nursing curriculum developed by the IPNRC and the Church Health Center guides registered nurses on the development of health ministries in their congregations. As students explore church history and the roots of faith community nursing in the Christian tradition and other faith traditions, they also experience spiritual growth through self-reflection and exercises in prayer and self-care. Modules address topics of professionalism in faith community nursing practice such as legal issues and documentation requirements. Students learn about communication styles and how to improve collaboration skills and they discover proven methods of developing a new ministry. (cont'd)



The faith community nurses learn how to utilize their skills in the independent areas of nursing practice to assess the needs of their individual client, family or community and to develop a plan of care to meet the identified needs.

During the retreat time, modules that this instructor believes are best explored in person are

presented. In California, Tami Levin and Emily Wu Troung from the National Alliance for Mental Illness presented “In Our Own Voice” which explores behavioral health issues from the perspective of presenters who have lived with mental illness. It was a powerful story of distress and recovery. Bernita Walker, Executive Director of Project: Peacemakers, Inc., LA County Domestic Violence, gave an in depth presentation on the issues surrounding domestic violence. Together the

students offered devotionals, learned about different prayer practices, spiritual care and how to work with those who are suffering grief and loss.

Western Institute of Nursing Conference 2016

I had the great opportunity to present a poster abstract (Increasing Vaccination Rates in Perinatal Patient at Childbirth Education Class, see abstract below) at the 49th annual Western Institute of Nursing (WIN) Conference at the Disneyland Hotel (April 6-9, 2016). The conference theme was “Innovations in Engagement through Research, Practice, and Education.” George Demiris, PhD, FACMI, University of Washington provided the Keynote



presentation that focused on the use of technology in healthcare (specifically HEALTH-E, see link below for more information). I attended daily concurrent sessions, visited with colleagues, attended post-conference receptions, and spent time with my PhD cohort members from the University of Arizona. The conference helped to inspire new and creative ideas for research projects. I loved attending WIN because EVERYONE was extremely supportive and encouraging! Nursing leaders in research as well as novice researchers were approachable and provided an open invitation to support you and your research ideas. This was

Increasing Vaccination Rates in Perinatal Patients at Childbirth Education Class

Purposes/Aims: To increase perinatal influenza and pertussis vaccination (Tdap) rates by 50% at a Southern California Community Hospital.

Rationale/Background: Pregnant women and their babies are at an increased risk for influenza-related complications, including premature labor and preterm birth.

Additionally, pertussis outbreaks continue to

occur in the United States with infants at highest risk of severe illness, including hospitalization and death. Low vaccination rates leave many pregnant women and their infants unprotected against these serious vaccine-preventable diseases. The influenza vaccination is recommended in any trimester for all women who are pregnant or who plan to become pregnant during the influenza season, and the pertussis vaccination (Tdap) is recommended between 27 and 36 weeks of each pregnancy.

Mothers who receive Tdap between 27 to 36 weeks develop antibodies and provide passive immunity to the baby. Infants less than 30 days of life represent the highest mortality rates from pertussis. Immunization rates for these vaccines were low at Southern California Community Hospital (influenza 22% and Tdap 23%). Literature reports that education and ease of obtaining vaccinations helps to improve perinatal vaccination rates. However, rates continue to remain low despite provider and educational campaigns. Childbirth class could provide timely accessibility for perinatal patients as they typically attend between 27 to 36 weeks gestation.

Undertaking/best practice/approach/methods/process: Two methods were used to obtain data. The number of influenza and Tdap vaccinations provided from the Southern California Community Hospital during 2014-2015 and 2015-2016 influenza seasons were obtained from pharmacy distribution logs. Perinatal patients were asked to complete a five-item pre-questionnaire at the time of childbirth education class sign-up. Influenza and Tdap injections were provided and administered by the hospital clinicians during childbirth education classes. Perinatal patients were given a vaccination card indicating that they received the influenza and Tdap injections. Perinatal patients were asked to complete a post-questionnaire. Data from pre and post-questionnaires were compared as well as perinatal vaccination rates from 2014-2015 and the 2015-2016 influenza season. **Outcomes achieved/documentated:** Data collection is in progress.

Conclusions: Preventable diseases such as influenza and pertussis represent high mortality rates for both the mothers and their babies. Improvements in perinatal vaccination rates can be made by providing education and increasing timely accessibility at childbirth education classes. Future projects should identify education and timely accessibility opportunities for household members living amongst perinatal patients and for perinatal patients who cannot attend childbirth class.

In recognition of our 40th anniversary, this year's featured presenters were all nurses who graduated from APU in the 80's, 90's, 2000's and 2010's: Ani John, PhD; Janice Haley, PhD; and June Rondinelli, PhD. A faculty research panel moderated by Dean Lesh included Felicitas dela Cruz, Aurelia Macabasco-O'Connell, Cheryl Westlake, Renee Pozza, and Lynn Woods. The day ended with a historic panel of nursing theorists moderated by Vivien Dee: Callista Roy, Jean Watson, and Dorothy Jones.

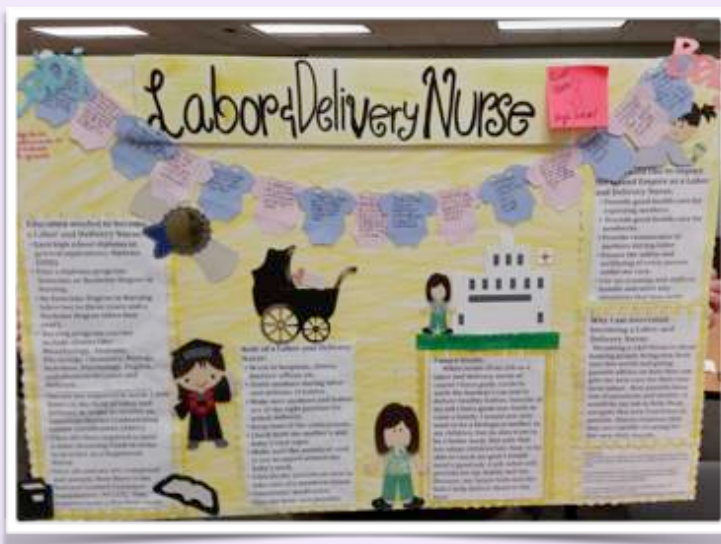

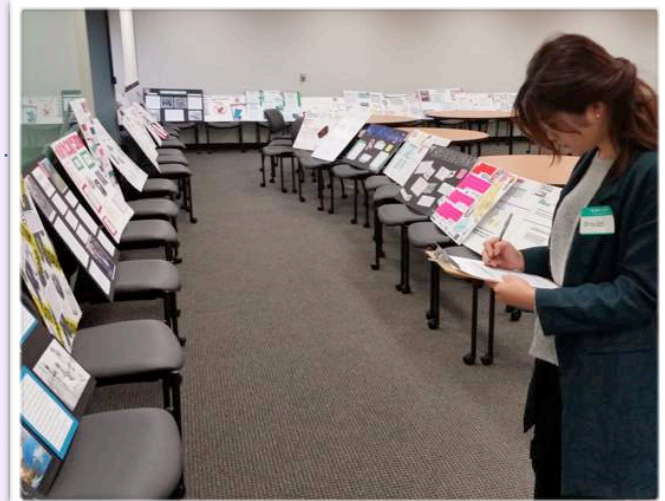
Inland Empire "Health Care for ME in the IE" Poster Contest

APU School of Nursing (SON), the Inland Coalition (part of "Reach Out" a non-profit organization) and **Iota Sigma** co-sponsored the Inland Empire & High Desert Poster Contest, "Health Care for ME in the IE" on March 7th-8th, 2016. APU SON Director of Recruitment & Enrollment, Valerie Floyd-Davis coordinated the contest, aimed at motivating and encouraging students to pursue careers in health care in the Inland Empire and High Desert region. Participants were asked to submit an abstract and a

poster on the theme of "Health Care for ME in the Inland Empire," incorporating their vision, as potential, future health care providers, for health care promotion in the Inland Empire region. Over 175 middle school and high school students from Victor Valley, the High Desert, and the Inland Empire region submitted abstracts and posters. Participants were from a variety of socio-economic backgrounds, some being the only one in their family to pursue a higher education. Students showed interest in a variety of professions including nursing, medicine, and pharmaceuticals. The contest was judged by APU School of Nursing faculty and Iota Sigma members (Grace Oh, Brandon Woodruff, Kyoko Suzuki, and Marilyn Klakovich) who graded the posters based on criteria concerning presentation, organization, communication skills, and content. Since some students submitted posters for veterinary medicine, Marilyn recruited her niece, Alexis Rambaud, DVM, to judge those posters and Valerie asked her husband who specializes in physical training, judged the Sports Medicine posters.

Homeless Healthcare Outreach Report 2015-2016

Eighteen years ago APU School of Nursing faculty, Dr. Connie Brehm, was invited by some LA County public health nurses to join in an effort to bring healthcare to homeless of the Winter Shelter Program of East San Gabriel Valley Coalition for the Homeless. Thus began APU School of Nursing's Homeless Healthcare Outreach. Our first effort consisted of weekly visits to the Winter Shelter Program by Dr. Brehm with three of her masters level FNP students. The County PHNs provide flu



vaccine and TB screening. Now in 2016 our healthcare outreach to the homeless operates year round with weekly visits on Tuesday mornings to the Emergency Assistance Center of ESGVCH in Hacienda Heights, and during winter season we hold Thursday evening clinics at the ESGVCH Winter Shelter Program. Our outreach clinics are staffed by APU nurse faculty and nursing students with up to 200 homeless clients receiving nursing services over the course of a year. Also, noteworthy is the total of 115 nursing students who participated this year, with their clinic hours counting toward practicum hours in their courses. A generous grant of \$2700 from Sigma Theta Tau, Iota Sigma Chapter this year helped assure that clinical faculty from School of Nursing were available to mentor students and oversee quality of care. The clinical faculty who participated in the outreach this year (in

addition to Dr. Brehm) included: Professors Virginia Hart-Kepler, Myrna Trippon, Rosemarie Santiago, and Dr. Leslie Van Dover. Other funding for the APU Homeless Outreach comes from annual grants from Kaiser Baldwin Park Medical Center Community Benefits Program (\$10,000 this year) and from generous donors who support our work. During a year's Outreach the APU students and faculty make a real difference in the health of the homeless. Below is a listing of some of the most dramatic and important outcomes of this year's healthcare outreach services:

- Numerous clients were referred and followed-up for primary care at a local community health center. Others were assisted to get in touch with their assigned primary care physicians;
- Several clients were admitted for substance abuse treatment and counseling with good results;
- Others were sent for specialty healthcare that included: vision exams with fitting and provision of glasses; dental care; wound care; and podiatry care;
- One acutely suicidal client was connected with emergency department, following up weeks later nurses observed that his depression improved and suicidal tendencies subsided;
- A young woman with psychiatric problems, who was in an abusive relationship, was connected to inpatient psychiatric care;
- 15 clients who were very ill were provided with motel nights (3-7 nights) for respite and recovery.
- In addition to the above many clients received care for various ailments of respiratory ailments (colds, asthma, COPD symptoms), strains and sprains, dermatologic conditions and GI problems.

Haley, J. (2016). Discovering the strength of parents whose children are at end of life. *Journal of Hospice & Palliative Nursing, 18(2)*, 139-148.

Abstract: Parents who provide care for their child receiving palliative/hospice care at home need an enormous amount of inner-strength to carry on with such care. The purpose of this study was: 1) to identify the strengths of primary parent caregivers of children receiving in-home hospice/palliative care, and 2) to assess if the Haley Transcultural Strengths Assessment Interview Guide increases parent's realization of the *importance* and *utilization* of their strengths. This descriptive study was conducted using a grounded theory design employing a qualitative framework and a quantitative component. Constant comparative analysis described was used to identify the attributes of strength. Participants of this study were parents caring for their child at home, who were recruited from TrinityKids Care in California. Eleven themes emerged from the data, with a sub-theme of "the child" who was dying. *Spirituality* emerged as the most important strength, with *positive attitude* and *finding meaning* rating second. Results revealed the key strengths of parent caregivers and the Strengths Guide was found to be an effective intervention for palliative/hospice care providers to assist parents to build on their strengths.
